Judging Photographic Images Larry Breitkreutz, FCAPA

Questions sometimes arise as to how a judge determines the score that a photograph deserves. Judging can sometimes be seen as controversial, and not all judges will agree on the merits of every image, for no matter how qualified or experienced a judge may be, there is always the human element that enters in. One of the processes that can be very helpful in



judging is to look at the image in terms of it's composition, exposure, depth-of-field, impact and technique. Whether the subject is a fine portrait, a panoramic landscape, a slum alley, a studio table top arrangement, or anything else, only with good composition will it achieve meaning and importance.

The purpose of composition is to control the eye of the viewer. With good composition, the artist leads viewers through the photograph in a controlled manner. Composition is the artist's way of bringing order into a non-ordered world. But what is good composition? How can one tell whether an image is strong or weak? While there are many so-called rules of composition, it is best to think of them as ideas, or principles.

They are not sacred rules carved in stone, but rather design ideas that can be used to control the viewers eye. To name just a few: leading lines, visual paths through the image, S-curve, repetition and pattern, balance, subject placement, direction of light, focal point, rule of thirds, scale, contrast and tone, etc. Not every image will display all of these ideas. But by careful placement of the elements in the image space using one or more of these principles, a stronger message may be conveyed.

Another factor that the judge will consider is exposure. Is the image properly exposed? The question then arises, what is proper exposure? The colors should not be washed out, or too dark. Detail should be visible in the dark shadows, as well as in the highlights. Unless, of course, the photographer is using a creative way of handling exposure, such as, high key or low key lighting. The judge must try to determine what the original intention of the photographer may have been, and perhaps more importantly, was this intention achieved?

Depth-of-field is another important aspect of any photographic image. Photos of landscapes generally require the image to be tack sharp from front to back. Any blurring in the image needs to be analyzed to determine if it is there for creative effect, or was it simply an unintentional accident of a careless photographer? However, many creative uses of depth-of-field are common where intentional blur is used for creative effect and to direct the eye of the beholder. This is often a very useful creative technique in macro photography. The judge must analyze the depth-of-field and determine how well the photographer handled this important element.

Most judges will have seen many good images, and even excellent images. So the photograph that makes the greatest impact will standout above the others. It will has been used that enhances the image and sets it above the rest?

have a "wow" factor, and may reveal something new, creative and interesting. Many factors may contribute to the impact of an image; light, subject matter, color, something new, an ordinary subject shown in an extraordinary way, etc. This is where the photographer's creative ability often shines.

Another aspect the judge will consider is the technique used to create the photograph. The outstanding image will usually display something new or innovative. The judge may examine the photograph to see if a technique such as, long exposure, motion blur, HDR, infrared, etc.

By a careful review of the composition, exposure, depth-of-field, impact and technique, the judge can assign an appropriate evaluation to the image. Meaningful comments by the judge can also be very useful in the photographer's growth and development.

A Trip to Alaska Bahman Doustdar

In summer of 2016 I had a 7-day trip to Alaska, a state that Americans call "the last frontier" and I had heard a lot about extreme beauty of its nature. I decided to put my camera into good use in this trip and register some of the natural beauties of Alaska in , I made sure that I had enough memory cards, an extra battery, and a battery charger in my camera backpack. One does not have to wait to



get to Alaska to start taking interesting pictures.



It can start right from the very beginning of the trip before and during boarding the cruise-liner. He outside view of the huge cruise ship as well as its deck, its chimney and many other parts and corners of it provide any one with keen eyes for photography with many opportunities for great shots. After leaving Vancouver for Alaska, the cruise liner passes through the long Strait of Georgia, on right side of which lies the mainland Canada, and on the shores of Vancouver Island can be seen. Strait of Georgia is dotted with many scenic small rock or forest-covered islands. If lucky, in day time you may also see sea otters resting on rocks or some whales passing by. Keep your camera at hands for such occasions. Next morning we were at the Southern tip of Alaska and the cruise liner docked at the small port city of Ketchikan. Ketchikan is a neat and beautiful small city. In few hours one can walk to the four corner of it. It is surrounded on three sides by mountains that are covered with dense forests and mist.



In Alaska the first thing that grabs your attention is the vastness of the land and purity of its nature. Its majestic snow-covered mountains, its dense forests, beautiful bays and sounds, its awe-inspiring glaciers and waterfalls are all feasts for the eyes of the visitors of the land. One will also notice that the dominant colors in Alaskan nature are green, blue and grey; a paradise for those interested in black and white photography!



Dominance of such colors is perhaps the reason why in Alaskan cities great many buildings are painted with warm colors such as yellow, red, etc. For instance, you can see many such colorful buildings in Ketchikan. There are many wooden or stone or metal statues depicting the aboriginal people of the land, miners, animals, etc. around in the city. Besides natural scenery, these are also very good subjects for photography.



In every city in Alaska you can see many stores that sell precious or semi-precious stones such jade and tanzanite or jewelry and artifacts made of them. They also sell artifacts made of gold, whale bones, and imported ivory. Some of these artifacts are very elaborated and beautiful, especially those made by indigenous artists. To take picture of them, of course you should ask for the store manager's permission first.

Beware that cheap and fake replicas of the Alaskan natives' art imported from china are available in almost every gift shop too.

Our next destination was Juneau, the capital city of Alaska. The day after, we arrived at Juneau.



Here also we had few hours to visit the city and beyond.

Tours and excursions for tourists are readily available in every city in Alaska. Depending on your budget you can go on excursions by bus or train or kayak or helicopter or plain. Visiting glaciers is among the most popular tours. Not being a wealthy tourist, I and my companions chose to go on bus to see the Nugget falls and the glacier beside it, which cost us about \$ 65 per person. I am glad to say that it worth every penny. Nugget falls is breath-taking and a great subject for photography. And so is the glacier close to it. The nature around them with misty forests and shallow ponds are also amazing.



After Juneau, the cruise ship sailed towards another small port called Skagway. To reach Skagway, the ship passed through Glacier Bay and Chilkoot Inlet.

No doubt, this was the best and most beautiful part of our trip, and surely one of the most beautiful parts of the world.

On both sides of the bay rings of snow-capped high mountains soared into the sky, and every now and then a great glacier appeared and displayed its power and beauty to on lookers. By now, all enthusiast passengers were on the upper deck putting their cameras to work taking pictures or film. Here and elsewhere in Alaska I was stunned to see how fast fog or mist rises and covers forests, mountains and everything else; so much so that at times only tip of a high mountain remains visible. It gives a mysterious quality to the scenery and provides photographers with an opportunity to take some really interesting pictures.



Finally we reached the very small town of Skagway.

However, I found Skagway more impressive than Ketchikan and Juneau, mostly because of the effort undertaken to preserve the city's historical heritage. Skagway owes its existence to the famous Klondike gold rush in late 19th century. It was the place where those in search of gold stayed and prepared themselves for the last part of their journey to Klondike fields. Today, still a number of buildings and objects belonging to that era are preserved in their original forms and on display visitors of Skagway.





After visiting Skagway, we went back on board of the cruise. In themorning we woke up at Anchorage which is a much bigger city but had no chance to spend time there. According to our schedule we had to go directly to the airport and fly to Vancouver.

It was a memorable trip and a great experience!



Ceremony of Goddesses Masoud Soheili

At the northeast of Iran, in Turkmen semi-desert zone, Golestan Province, at the border of Turkmenistan, at the top of a chain of mountains, there is an unknown site with a lot of statues, "Phallus".

First, it reminds us the Goddess of the Birth, like the ones in India and South-west Asia. But, it's completely different. Here, its shape is completely like the real Phallus, and some others like the upside-down one, or maybe a figure of a woman, showing the body and the breasts.

With more thought, and seeing the arrangement of the statues, you see a cemetery in front of yourself. The stone-tombs are in the shape of Phallus and upside-down Phallus. The heights are different, from 60 cm to 3 meters, due to the age of the deceased people.



it seems that the upside-down statues are the tombs of the women and the normal ones are the tombs of the men. The ones with lower heights are belonged to the children, boy and girl, two different shapes.



There is a special location for the ruler of the region. At the top of highest mountain, the King and the Queen are buried. The other people are buried as seen in the arrangement of the even new cemeteries in the region. Some statues are fallen down or broken, as some people always looking for treasures in such regions. For installing the statues, the length of it underground is equal to its length outside. There is no written text on

these unknown statues. These shapes shows the thought of Persian people in Elam era and the importance and the at sanctity of the sexuality that time, as it was usual in that era in the other parts of the world, in other civilized societies, India, South-east Asia...





The site is located at a place that some four religious places(Imam-zadeh Khaled Nabi, his uncle and his cousins) are located too, at a higher position. At the higher point, there is a place, with rectangular 2 some meters height woods, which cures toothache, if someone tooth touches the woods. These religious places belong to about some 200 years ago or less; but it seems that this site has about 5000



years old and belongs to Elam era in ancient Persia.



There are also other ideas on this site. Some people say that this site was a temple a day. It doesn't seem right. There's no sign of a structure.

These symbols do not shape a construction too. Others say that each statue was a private goddess for a limited people, for example for a family... (as Totems for North Americans), but, anyway, a cemetery or a gathering of goddesses... it should be near a city or a big village... where people could have easy access to it. At the top of a range of mountains, far from every civilization, long cold winters, could not place anything such this. Surely, there was a great gathering of people here at 5000 years ago. Nothing is left now! The local people have different ideas for these statues.

Some says that the upside-down statues are the soldiers, and the Phallus statues are their swords.

When the soldiers wanted to rush the Imam-zadeh, they changed to stone...

These symbols of sexuality have their best show off at spring, when the mountains are green with grass and herbs, and are rather red with wild Anemone. The site has a complete erotic shape; these statues with combination of the special forms of the hills and mountains are completely erotic; I've never seen such hills before.

At spring with green background and at winter with the white one, a photographer could take the best forms and photos there,



and of course erotic photos too. Enough light, make it easy to use 100 ASA films. Konica film (with most-blue color) and a polarized filter, results a good blue for this strange scenery. Normal & Tele lenses have the most use for the photography of this site, and a wide lens to have some total views.






